Peter Carlisle, Honolulu Prosecuting Attorney, Luncheon Speaker

On Wednesday, April 16, Aloha Chapter members will gather for a special luncheon beginning at 1100 at the Hickam AFB Officers' Club. This location has a larger area than some of our other luncheon venues. The extra space will certainly be needed for this joint luncheon with our friends in the Hawaii Chapter because the featured guest speaker is the charismatic and capable **Peter Carlisle**, Prosecuting Attorney for the City and County of Honolulu. He personally handles his high-profile cases. Noteworthy of his successful prosecutions were the Honolulu Police Officer Clyde Arakawa DUI/Manslaughter case that resulted in a 20-year sentence and the heinous Bryan Uyesugi case, the deadliest incident of mass murder in Hawaii, that ended with the most severe sentence in Hawaii, life without the possibility of parole. Peter is currently prosecuting the circumstantial Kirk Lankford case (no questions will be permitted on this ongoing case.)

Peter Carlisle has come a long, circuitous way geographically and professionally from New Jersey to Hawaii. After attending school in Connecticut and then graduating from the University of North Carolina with degrees in psychology and English, he went to UCLA School of Law. Upon his graduation from UCLA in 1977 with his Juris Doctor degree, he was recruited as a Deputy Prosecutor for the C & C of Honolulu, attaining the position of Chief of the Career Criminal Unit a decade later.

Peter Carlisle has briefly also been a faculty member of Hastings College of Trial Advocacy, San Francisco, CA, the National Advocacy Center, Columbia, SC, and the National Institute of Trial Advocacy, South Bend, IN, and an adjunct professor at the University of Hawaii Richardson School of Law.

On November 5, 1996, **Peter Carlisle** was elected Prosecuting Attorney, defeating David Arakawa, who was endorsed by Keith Kaneshiro, the Prosecuting Attorney since 1988. It was a close race. **Peter**, now serving on his third term, has easily won two subsequent elections.


Peter Carlisle's numerous awards and honors include the Law Enforcement Commendation Medal, Sex Abuse Treatment Center Award presented to the individual who has greatly contributed to the lives of sexual assault victims, Top Cop Award received by him on behalf of the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney for outstanding law enforcement in Hawaii, induction into the Hawaii Joint Police Association's Hall of Fame, and the 2002 MADD National Criminal Justice Award.

Peter Carlisle has spoken both nationally and internationally on a variety of subjects including terrorism, drunken driving, homicides, crimes against tourists, and key drug and murder cases. There will be a 10-15 minute question and answer period after his talk to personally present any concerns to him.

In Memoriam

At noon on Friday, March 28, a sad, yet beautiful, Hawaiian memorial service was held at the Kamehameha Schools Chapel commemorating the remarkable life of our fellow Aloha Chapter member, **Curtis Kekoa**, COL, USAF, Ret., 87, who died on March 19 at Tripler Army Medical Center.

Born on November 19, 1920, in Honolulu, **Curtis Kekoa**, a full Hawaiian, grew up in Wai-pahu, graduated from the Kamehameha Schools and then joined the Army Air Corps in 1942.

In World War II, **Kekoa** piloted B-17 bombers, flying 20 combat missions in the European theater; during the Korean War, he flew 100 F-84 fighter jet missions.

During a 31-year military career, **Kekoa** also piloted C-54 cargo planes during the 1946-48 Berlin Airlift, served as director of operations of the Royal Thai Air Force Advisory Group during the Vietnam War, and held staff appointments at the North American Air Defense Command and military headquarters in Hawai'i.

Aloha Chapter member **Vernon Von**, a fellow retired Air Force officer, eloquently spoke of his friend **Curt's** military career, saying he "was the most decorated Hawaiian pilot." **Kekoa's** service citations include the Distinguished Flying Cross with seven Oak Leaf Clusters; Bronze Star Medal; World War II Victory Medal; Korean Service Medal; United Nations Service Medal; National Defense Service Medal; Air Force Outstanding Unit Award; Air Force Commendation Ribbon; and Legion of Merit.

Kekoa earned his law degree from USC in 1977 and served as chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee for a Hawaiian Trustee of the Kamehameha Schools/Bishop Estate.

He is survived by his wife, **Jane Takahara Kekoa**; a daughter, three sons, two stepdaughters, a brother and a sister, seven grandchildren (two of whom performed a lovely hula at the memorial service) and five great-grandchildren.

Four Aloha Chapter Scholarships Awarded

Four 2008 Aloha Chapter college scholarships have been awarded.

Following an important goal of supporting critical needs of Hawaii, two scholarships of \$1,000 each went to honors students majoring in teacher education. They are:

Erika Baldwin, a Hawaii Pacific University student whose objective is to become a high school mathematics teacher. She said the example set by several members of her family in the education profession inspired her to become a teacher.

Zachary Mourad, also a HPU student, hopes "to learn different teaching methods and employ them in a way that will result in higher achievement for my students" and become a positive influence in their lives.

Two scholarships of \$500 each have been approved for advanced course ROTC cadets at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. The winners are:

Glendale Williams, a 4.0 GPA Army ROTC

Aaron Patterson, an Air Force ROTC Flight Commander. He grew up on Kauai, graduated from Kauai High School and attended Kauai Community College before transferring to UH Manoa. He majors in political science and hopes to enter the security forces when commissioned.

Wesley Fong Recipient of Jefferson Award

The national Jefferson Awards for Public Service, locally sponsored by *The Advertiser* and KGMB-9 TV, are given each year to ordinary local people who do extraordinary things for the community. Past recipients include Colin Powel and Sandra Day O'Conner.

There were only five awardees in Hawaii this year. Aloha Chapter is extremely proud to announce that one of them was Aloha Chapter member **Wesley Fong**, COL, USA, Ret., Vietnam War Veteran and now an attorney in Honolulu and a law professor at UH, who will be honored in a special ceremony on April 2nd.

In 2004 **Wes**, 55, was elected president and Chairman of the Board of the Palolo Chinese Home, a charitable organization for which he started volunteering in 2002 on the Heritage Campaign Committee, raising the vital funds for the sustained growth of the Home. His long and fervent dedication for giving back to the Home came from his parents, who had found a safe haven at the Home for their remaining days, and who instilled in him his life-long philosophy of giving back to the community.

Due to his leadership and personal efforts, the Committee raised over \$1,000,000 in donations and pledges from over 70% of the active Chinese societies and members, which became the catalyst for contributions from the State of Hawaii, City and County of Honolulu, and many private non-profit foundations and private enterprises, resulting in over \$12,000,000 for the capital improvements for the Home. Consequently, the Lani Booth Hall Building was renovated adding a 30-resident capacity Adult Day Care Center and 15 new skilled nursing beds to the to the already existing Victoria Ward Adult Residential Care Building with 50 beds.

By mid 2007, under his dedicated leadership and after he had assumed the additional duties of CEO, the Home finally began construction on the new three-story food service building with a state-of-the-art kitchen, a wellness center, and two stories housing 46 more skilled nursing beds adding to its 15 nursing home residents and 30 day care seniors. It is scheduled to be completed in late 2008, at which time it will more efficiently furnish over 6000 meals on wheels in addition to the new overnight respite.

Wesley's vision and leadership as a dedicated community service leader has played an essential role in the Home's phenomenal progress and development. By the end of 2005 the Home's operations went into the black and they became financially independent, enabling it to continue expanding its long-term care to the elders in our community. **Bravo Zulu Wes!**

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Military Widows Win Right To Sue For Denied Survivor Pay

A U.S. Court of Federal Claims judge has given a green light to three military widows to sue the government for a combined \$105,000 – the accumulated value of [Survivor Benefit Plan](#) (SBP) payments that, the widows contend, have been unlawfully withheld since Dec. 16, 2003.

In a 24-page opinion denying the government's motion to dismiss the case, Judge George W. Miller found that both the facts and the law favor the widows and counter every legal argument raised by government attorneys.

If they win their case, hundreds of surviving spouses in the same category could be in line for hefty SBP repayments too. That category is precise: surviving spouses who remarried at 57 or older and who have had their SBP cut or wiped out by their decision to accept Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) from the Department of Veterans Affairs.

The lawsuit challenges how the Department of Defense has interpreted a provision of the [Veterans Benefits Act](#) of 2003 [Public Law 108-183]. The widows argue that [Congress](#) intended for them to be among the first small group of surviving military spouses deemed eligible for "concurrent receipt" of both SBP and DIC. In other words, they were to be the first of 44,000 dual-eligible widows to be exempt from the so-called SBP-DIC offset.

Under SBP, service members nearing retirement elect to pay a monthly premium so that, in case of their death, their surviving spouse or a dependent child continues to receive up to 55 percent of their annuity.

DIC, meanwhile, is a fixed amount of monthly compensation offered to families of 1) service members who die while on active duty or 2) military retirees who die of their service-related disabilities.

If a surviving spouse drawing SBP qualifies also for tax-free DIC, the law requires that taxable SBP be reduced dollar-for-dollar by DIC. Basic DIC is now \$1067 a month with extra amounts

paid for each dependent child.

It's important to understand that, until December 2003, DIC stopped for any surviving spouse who remarried. But the Veterans Benefits Act of 2003 modified that rule. It allowed DIC to continue, or be restored, if the surviving spouse remarried at 57 or older. This provision made more than 12,000 widows eligible again for DIC if they knew to apply for it.

Despite protests from affected widows, Defense pay officials and lawyers declined in 2004 to interpret the law to allow concurrent receipt. Like other surviving spouses, these widows saw that as their DIC kicked in, their SBP fell away. Last July, three of them filed their complaint with the claims court, with support from [Gold Star Wives of America](#). Patricia R. Sharp, remarried widow of an Army brigadier general, said she was owed more \$50,000 in SBP. Margaret M. Haverkamp, remarried widow a retired Army lieutenant colonel, is owed \$18,800, the complaint said. Iva Dean Rogers, remarried widow of an Army master sergeant, is owed \$36,000.

The SBP she now is denied, Mrs. Rogers said, began in 1976, the year her first husband, Arlan E. Wilson, died just two years into his retirement after 32 years as a decorated soldier and combat tours in three wars.

"That was all I had," said Rogers, now 82, of her early SBP. "He had had a life in the Army of wars after wars where I was left alone with my two boys for month and month. So I felt like I was eligible" for that SBP.

After VA determined that her husband's brain stem cancer was service connected and qualified her for DIC, the SBP annuity stopped and his premiums were refunded. In 1996, when she remarried at 70, her DIC stopped. Mrs. Rogers said she went without any survivor payments for years, not realizing she was eligible to resume SBP given her age at remarriage. SBP isn't impacted by remarriage after age 55.

When the 2003 law restored her eligibility for DIC but removed her SBP again, Mrs. Rogers decided last year to join in the lawsuit, both for

the money at stake and to help educate other widows to the "unfairness" of the SBP-DIC offset. It should end for any surviving spouse, she said.

The government maintains that the intent of the 2003 law is unclear. Even if Congress did want surviving spouses to draw both SBP and DIC, by virtue of remarriage at 57, the language enacted is too imprecise to allow it.

Judge Miller disagreed. The 2003 law did indeed "partially repeal" the SBP-DIC offset for "those surviving spouses who receive DIC by virtue of their having remarried after the age of 57."

Michael R. Franzinger, a lawyer for the widows, said Miller's point-by-point rejection of the motion to dismiss "resolves the central legal question in the case" even though the case isn't over.

If the judge accepts the widows' motion for summary judgment, as now seems likely, Franzinger said, "my hope is" that the government will allow that ruling to apply to "other, similarly situated spouses of veterans."

Age 62 Widows Tax is History

The infamous Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) age-62 "widow's tax" will finally be eliminated as of April 1, 2008. Prior to the law change MOAA won in 2005, SBP was reduced at age 62 from 55% of covered retired pay to 35% (covered retired pay could be as low as \$300 or as high as full retired pay). The FY2005 Defense Authorization Act phased out the age-62 benefit reduction over a 4 year period.

April 1 marks the end of the Social Security offset and a significant improvement to a critical benefit. SBP annuitants who are drawing Social Security benefits should see an increase in their May 1 SBP checks (which is payment for April) to reflect 55% of the deceased retiree's covered retired pay.

The increases phased in over the last 4 years represent up to a cumulative 57% increase in benefits -- excluding the effects of annual inflation adjustments, which make the increase even larger. Congress recognized that these two benefits are earned independently of one another through service and sacrifice to our nation.

On Wednesday, March 19, at Pohai Nani, Kaneohe, Dr. **Bradley J. Willcox**, a physician and investigator in geriatrics at the Pacific Health Research Institute and a physician at the Queen's and Kuakini Medical Centers, gave a thought-provoking PowerPoint presentation to 65 Aloha and Hawaii Chapter members on how to attain a longer life. He ought to know; he is the co-author of the best-selling *The Okinawa Program*, a study of the most centenarians per capita on Okinawa than anywhere else in the world.

His key admonitions were to not smoke, eat less, drink very little liquor, eat more vegetables and less meat, exercise more and, nevertheless, try to enjoy life and have a positive, happy outlook.
