Appropriately, the buffet is a Hawaiian luau since our guest speaker, Kalani Brady, M.D., is the University of Hawaii Associate Professor & Interim Chairman for Native Hawaiian Health. His broad topic will be Hawaiian Culture.

Kalani Brady traces his roots to the Keli'ikanaka'oleaipolani family from Kaua'i. spending his early childhood in various areas of the country as a military dependent, Kalani was raised in Hawai'i, graduating from St. Anthony's School in Kailua, and later as Valedictorian and Student Body VicePresident from St. Louis High School. During high school, he conducted medical research projects in platelet function at Kuakini Medical Research Institute, and developed a computerized database of thyroid disease patients at the Straub Clinic through the Straub Medical Research Institute.

Congratulation to two of our Aloha Chapter members who were recognized with very prestigious honors in June.

First, LTG Allen Ono, USA,

Ret., the Chairman of our Board of Directors, was inducted into the AG Hall of Fame. LTG **Allen Ono**, also chair of the U.S. Army Retiree Council-Hawaii, along with 10 other top Army Personnel and Human Services leaders, was honored in a ceremony that marked the first inductees into the Adjutant General's Corp Hall of Fame at Fort Jackson, S. C., on June 11, 2010.

Memorials honoring the inductee's contributions to the Army and the AG Corp will remain on permanent display in the AG Corps Hall of Fame within the AG School.

And, secondly, as you may have noticed in the local weekly *MidWeek*, member **Wesley Fong** was selected as a Lifetime Distinguished University of Hawaii Alumnus. That is indeed an honor!

Congratulations to both of our exceptional members!



Kalani attended Harvard University on a fourvear National Merit Scholarship and Harvard National Scholarship, focusing on premedical studies and the performing arts. While at Harvard, he performed with the Opera Company of Boston, the Boston Symphony Orchestra, and the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra, and was soloist of the Harvard Glee Club for four years. He graduated with honors in Engineering and Applied Physics, and enrolled at the University of Hawai'i to pursue graduate studies in Public Health. In the next two years, he received his Masters and Doctorate, all but dissertation, in Biostatistics and Epidemiology before enrolling at the University of Pennsylvania to complete his dissertation work in acute lymphocytic leukemia and his medical studies in 1982.

He then returned to Hawai'i for residency training in internal medicine, and concurrent with

work in two of the Oʻahu's community health centers, became the physician in residence at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel. After a decade at the Royal Hawaiian, he transferred from that Straub satellite to the main King Street facility, where he practiced for eight years. He is Board Certified in Internal Medicine, a Fellow of the American College of Physicians, and Governor of the Hawaiʻi Chapter of the American College of Physicians.

In 2003, **Kalani** was appointed Associate Professor in the Department of Native Hawaiian Health of the University of Hawaiii John A. Burns School of Medicine, where he serves as Interim Chair since May 2009, and was Associate Chair from 2003 to 2006. For the past fourteen years he is the doctor on the weekly program "Ask the Doctor" on KHON FOX Channel 2 Morning News, hosted the fall 2005 PBS weekly medical show "UH on Call", and co-hosted the weekly medical talk show "Health in Paradise"

to progressively better relations—thankfully—with Mainland China (PRC).

This has occurred since of the election of Nationalist Party President Ma Ying-jeou in 2008. We had no idea that Taiwan and China had become so closely connected economically (just like the U.S., which is beholden to China now).

We were especially intrigued by the nuances of words and how important they are in diplomatic relations. For example, two years ago direct flights began between the ROC and the PRC and now there are over 300 "cross strait"—not international—flights a week.

Philip Wang said that he has really enjoyed his assignment in our Aloha State for the last 4 years and will be leaving shortly for a promotion to a posting with the ROC government in Taipei. We wish him well!


