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
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### President's Message

Stay Alert: Protect Yourself from Membership Scams

MOAA often uses email and online channels to communicate with its members about their membership status. However, we realize it may sometimes be difficult to discern legitimate messaging from scams. If you receive an email or online message about your membership that seems suspicious, do not respond. Contact MOAA's Member Service Center immediately at 800-234-6622 to verify its legitimacy.

MOAA provides scam prevention resources at [MOAA.org/scams](http://MOAA.org/scams) that can help you combat all types of fraud. Some MOAA-specific details that may help you spot suspicious messaging:

- Life members whose dues are paid in full will never be asked for additional dues payments.
- Spouses of deceased Life members inherit their membership at no additional cost.
- Spouses are not eligible for membership; MOAA will never solicit a spouse to join. (Surviving spouses, however, are eligible for membership.)
- Basic and Premium members may receive renewal or upgrade communications from MOAA via mail, email, text message, or phone. If you're unsure whether a message is authentic, DO NOT REPLY to the message — contact the Member Service Center at 800-234-6622 for confirmation.

## **Gone But Not Forgotten**

### **Stanley Furukawa**

Lt. Colonel (Ret.), USAF, a resident of Honolulu, passed away at the age of 93 on September 28, 2025, in Honolulu. He was born on Hawaii Island, the youngest of eight children of Tomojiro and Haruno Furukawa. Stanley dedicated his life to public service and family.

He proudly served for 21 years in the United States Air Force, with assignments here, on the mainland and abroad. Following his military retirement, he continued his public service for nearly 20 years with the City and County of Honolulu Building Department. Preceded in death by his wife of 46 years, Faye. He is survived by his two daughters, Wendy Kakaio (Derick) and Joy Furukawa, as well as many extended family members.

### **Tom Seale**

Thomas Arthur Seale, Lt. Colonel (Ret.), KH6AAA, passed away peacefully on July 9, surrounded by family. Tom was born in Berkeley, California, to Arthur Lisle Seale and Ethel (Marie-Attala) Plante Seale, who were married in Gleichen, Alberta, and emigrated together from western Canada to northern California, becoming naturalized US citizens in 1937 and 1945, respectively. Tom was proud of his Seale family roots in Barbados, where his father was born and raised, travelling by ship to Ellis Island and then making his way on to Canada at the age of sixteen.

Tom was drafted into the US Army in 1954, and became a commissioned officer in 1955. He underwent field artillery training at Fort Sill in Lawton, Oklahoma. He and Lois were married in 1956, and soon started a family that would grow to have four children. His first overseas post was in Korea, after which he returned to the US to command a Nike missile site near Malibu, California. The whole family sailed across the Atlantic on the USS Buckner to Tom's next assignment in West Germany. Tom took command of an air defense artillery unit in Regensburg for a year, then transferred to the Military Intelligence Branch in Heidelberg. His life-long love of photography stems from these years, when he was sent by the Army to the Leica Camera school. Tom and the family returned early to the US, living for a summer in Columbus, Georgia, while Tom trained an intelligence unit at Fort Benning, which he then led during his 1966 – 1967 tour in South Vietnam, attached to the 196th Light Infantry Brigade.

On his return stateside from Vietnam, Tom was selected for training in the Army's Foreign Area Officer Program, becoming fluent in the Thai language at the Defense Language Institute in Monterey, California, then going on to earn his Master of Arts degree in Asian Studies from Claremont Men's (later McKenna) College in Claremont, California. The family moved to Bangkok, Thailand in early 1970, where Tom's work included touring throughout the region before his appointment as a diplomatically accredited military attaché with the US Embassy. During their stay in Thailand, Tom and Lois undertook many Space-A flights on military aircraft with their family to Japan, Korea, the Philippines, India, and Spain, taking full advantage of the Department of Defense's Space Available program. All of their children grew up intimately familiar with C-rations, chipped beef on toast (SOS), and the military's general hurry-up-and-wait approach to time.

The family's time in Thailand ended in 1975, when Tom and Lois moved to the island of Oahu, Hawaii, where Tom was assigned to the offices of the Commander in Chief of the Pacific (CINCPAC). An online search using the term "Thomas Arthur Seale" on the US Library of Congress website will yield a video-recorded interview with Tom about his years of military service.

### **George Vickers**

George Franklin Vickers, a decorated U.S. Army soldier, respected Hawaiian real estate broker, and devoted community servant, husband, and father, passed away on December 3, 2025, in Pinehurst, NC, surrounded by family.

George was an adoring husband, inspiring father, and caring grandfather who raised his family to love the Lord. He was married to his high school sweetheart and beloved wife of 62 years, Patricia. He was blessed with three daughters and their husbands, six grandchildren, and nine great-grandchildren.

Born in West Virginia, George entered the United States Army as an enlisted infantry soldier and later graduated from Infantry Officer Candidate School. He was a "rompin stompin" Airborne Ranger serving in the Special Forces and retiring as a Lt. Colonel after 26 years of distinguished service.

George then built a successful real estate business in Hawaii, earning a reputation for having a "Midas touch" with an uncanny sense of the rhythms of the market. Later, he fulfilled a life-long dream as a professor of history at Hawaii Pacific University.

George's commitment to service extended well beyond his military and business careers. He was charismatic leader in the Association of the United States Army (AUSA). He was active in the Military Retired Officers Association, Special Forces Association, and a Rotarian, where he was Paul Harris Fellow.

George instilled the value of education in all he encountered. He earned a Bachelor of Science from Campbell College, a Master of Arts from the University of Missouri, and completed the University of Hawaii Executive Management Program

George was larger than life . . . an American Hero. Honoring his wishes, services will be at Arlington National Cemetery.

The son of Keiichi and Shizue Okihiro, George was pre-deceased by siblings Dr. Michael Okihiro and Helen Sakamoto, and survived by sisters Grace Wilson and Elaine Fujisaka.

## **What's In the FY 2026 NDAA ... and What's Next**

MOAA-backed protections for health care access, improvements to medical staffing procedures, and expanded support for currently serving members and their families are part of the more than 3,000 pages that make up the must-pass defense policy bill as it begins the final stages to becoming law.

MOAA is reviewing the full text of the FY 2026 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) to determine how its provisions may affect servicemembers, families, retirees, veterans, and the broader uniformed services community. Below, you'll find a recap of some of the key provisions of interest to MOAA.

The negotiated language, attached to an existing Senate bill (S. 1071) is scheduled for a Dec. 10 vote in the House. The bill would then return to the Senate, which can advance the measure by passing the identical text without further amendment. Once both chambers approve the same language, the bill will proceed to the president for signature.

### Key Provisions: Currently Serving

Pay Matters: A 3.8% increase to base pay across the board, a mandate to provide transparency on the calculation of the Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH), and an increase in Family Separation Allowance to \$300 a month, up from \$250.

PCS Report: The conference bill adopts the provisions of the House NDAA requiring the Pentagon to determine the extent of unreimbursed expenses servicemembers incur when they move to a new duty location. These include terminating utilities at old duty stations, security deposits at new duty stations, credit card charges associated with moves, costs associated with finding new employment for spouses, and pet relocation, among many others. Congress is looking to determine the impact on retention when there are so many ancillary tasks associated with frequent PCS moves.

## **Agent Orange Linked to Rare Blood Cancer That Develops Over Decades**

WASHINGTON — Vietnam War veterans exposed to Agent Orange have a higher risk of developing a rare blood cancer that develops slowly over decades, according to a new study that for the first time links myelodysplastic syndrome to widespread use of the herbicide.

Researchers say the breakthrough could help veterans with the syndrome access benefits and services from the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Without medical evidence that affirms a connection between Agent Orange and MDS, patients with the syndrome have struggled to qualify for service-connected benefits, said Dr. Michael Sekeres, chief of hematology at Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center at the University of Miami. Researchers at Sylvester conducted the eight-year study.

About 20,000 new cases of MDS are identified in the U.S. each year. Patients typically are over age 70 at diagnosis.

"I see veterans who develop these conditions and need expensive medical care, but I can't write a letter that establishes causality because, before this study, we hadn't clearly linked Agent Orange to MDS," Sekeres said.

An estimated 2.6 million service members likely were exposed to Agent Orange, according to researchers who disclosed their findings at the annual convention of the American Society of Hematology, which is being held this week in Florida.

Myelodysplastic syndrome, known as MDS, is a group of rare blood cancers that develop when a person's DNA is damaged. The disease progresses from a series of genetic mutations in blood stem cells, according to researchers.

Individuals exposed to Agent Orange tend to develop MDS earlier, according to the study's findings. They also are more likely to have aggressive forms of MDS that advance to acute myeloid leukemia, which is cancer of the blood and bone marrow.

“Many veterans and doctors have long questioned whether Agent Orange exposure during the Vietnam War contributed to cases of MDS. The chemical is linked to several cancers, but a link to MDS was unclear. This created real barriers for exposed veterans with MDS who are seeking care and disability benefits,” the Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center said this week.

The U.S. military sprayed Agent Orange to clear jungles and destroy enemy food crops. The defoliant was widely used at military installations, along roads and to clear paths to install communication lines.

Between 1962 and 1971, the U.S. military spread more than 19 million gallons of herbicide over forests in Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos.

“Though Agent Orange was not the only herbicide used, it was the most prevalent. Exposure to the chemicals from these operations has resulted in serious and ongoing health issues for Vietnam War veterans,” according to Disabled American Veterans, a national advocacy group.

Agent Orange was banned in 1971, and inventories were destroyed as scientists learned about the dangerous health effects of exposure. Troops who served in Vietnam or in waterways throughout the country between 1962 and 1975 are eligible for certain VA benefits for illnesses connected to Agent Orange exposure.

Exposure to the herbicide has been linked to non-Hodgkin lymphoma, multiple myeloma, leukemia, prostate cancer, Parkinson’s disease, ischemic heart disease, diabetes and birth defects that include spina bifida.
